Specialty biz steady, big titles scarce

here's no doubt that buyers were hungry at this year's Berlin European Film Market, but as sales agents packed up their stands on Wednesday one thing was clear — less standout product coupled with more discerning buvers made for a more cautious and steady Berlinale.
While Stuart Ford's IM Global

made waves with Madonna's second directorial effort "W.E." and Glen Basner's FilmNation secured solid international deals on Colin Firth and Cameron Diaz starrer "Gambit," there was a widespread consensus that the market was slow and lacking



new, big-name product, though Berlin isn't typically known for a slew of commercial titles

Even so, foreign distribs' ap-

petites weren't satiated, and many who were looking for bigger pics were left wanting more. See DEALS page 11

ermany has become the country the global film biz can't live without: More than 100 of the 385 worldwide films at the Berlinale were made with Teutonic par-

Of the 22 films in the main Competition section, 10 are German co-productions. The pics stretch from "Unknown," Jaume Collet-Serra's action thriller starring Liam Neeson, to Miranda July's quirky dramedy "The Future" and Alexander Mindadze's Russian Chernobyl disaster drama "Innocent Saturday.

"Unlike in the past, we currently have many films that may not be labeled German, but have Germany inside

Music Box plays 'Lisbon'

n its second pickup at Berlin. Music Box Films has taken all U.S. rights to Chilean Raul Ruiz's period drama "Mysteries of Lisbon," co-produced and sold by Paulo Branco's Alfama Films.

Music Box bought Liz Garbus' Sundance documentary "Bobby Fisher Against the World" earlier in the festival.

The "Lisbon" deal closed at

Berlin about an hour after a market screening, said Music Box prexy William Schopf. The U.S. pickup also includes "Lisbon's" six-hour miniseries spinoff.

An opulent 19th century epic melodrama tracing suffering through various generations, "Lisbon" runs 41/2 hours with an intermission. It adapts Camilo Castelo Branco's novel of the same title.

s the European market unwinds, Matteo Lova-dina's Paris-based Reel Suspects is racking up additional sales across its slate.

French director Laurent Bouhnik's erotic drama "Q" has presold to South Korea's Green Narae Media and Lovadina said he was in talks with a Japanese

Meanwhile, Koen Mort-ier's thriller "22nd of May" was picked up by Italy's Mov-

ies Inspired. Lovadina said "May" has received interest from German and buy-Swiss

Lovadina is also in talks with a French

distributor on Saulius Drunga's feature debut "Anarchy in Zirmunai.'

The deals follow a raft of early market sales, notably for "Anarchy," which was which was snatched up by Atlantide Entertainment for Italy and Pro Fun for Germany, Austria and German-speaking Switzer-

Lovadina, who launched Reel Suspects at the beginning of year, kicked off Berlin with two new acquisitions: David Verbeek's "Club Zeus," winner of Rotterdam's Return of the Tiger, and Peter Marcias' "Children of his Life, which was picked up by Atlantide.

FIAPF's general assembly, meeting during the Berlinale,

added Transvlvania, which marks its 10th anniversary in June, to its list of approved

Fest prexy Tudor Giurgiu said, "Our festival is one of the youngest to have ever received this recognition. We promise even greater editions in years to come.

Based in Cluj, Romania, the fest is the fourth Eastern European film showcase to receive the FIAPF seal of approval in the

land's Era New Horizons Film Festival and Bulgaria's Sofia Film Festival.

Modestly budgeted at €2.5 million (\$3.4 million) for the feature and TV series, Branco said, "Lisbon" has sold to Gallic paybox Canal Plus. Distribbed by Alfama, "Lisbon" has enjoyed a spirited sustained run in France, grossing about \$740,000 in 17 weeks.



Music Box will release "Lisbon" in the top-10 U.S. markets in September or October, Schoof said.



Buyers delve into Ruiz's Lisbon mystery

Veteran producer and Alfama boss Paulo Branco has confirmed a handful of sales on Raul Ruiz's *Mysteries Of Lisbon*.

The film, made both as a TV series and as a feature, has gone to Music Box for the US, Wanda for Spain and Swallow Wings for Taiwan.

As already announced, New Wave is aboard for the UK while Mostra De Sao Paulo will release



the film in Brazil. Alfama has been handling world sales, alongside Doc & Films International. Branco reports that several other countries are in negotiation to take the film.

Branco is now planning two further films with Ruiz. One, a small untitled film, will shoot at the end of the year. The other, *The Black Book Of Father Dennis*, is based on a book by Camilo Castelo Branco (author of *Mysteries Of Lisbon*), and will be on a far grander scale. The feature film will be shot in France and Italy in 2012.
